12	The introduction of tree and/or woodland management+ and changes in tree and/or woodland management+.
14	The changing of water levels and tables and water utilisation (including storage and abstraction).
20	Extraction of minerals, including topsoil, subsoil, and limestone.
21	Construction, removal or destruction of roads, tracks, walls, fences, hardstands, banks, ditches or other earthworks, or the laying, maintenance or removal of pipelines and cables, above or below ground.
22	Storage of materials.
23	Erection of permanent or temporary structures, or the undertaking of engineering works, including drilling.
24	Modification of natural or man-made features, including clearance of loose rock or scree and battering, buttressing or grading rock-faces and cuttings and infilling of quarries.
26	Use of vehicles likely to damage or disturb features of interest.
27	Recreational or other activities likely to damage woodland and cliff habitat and wildlife interest.
28	Introduction of game management and changes in game management and hunting practice.

* 'animal' includes any mammal, reptile, amphibian, bird, fish or invertebrate.
